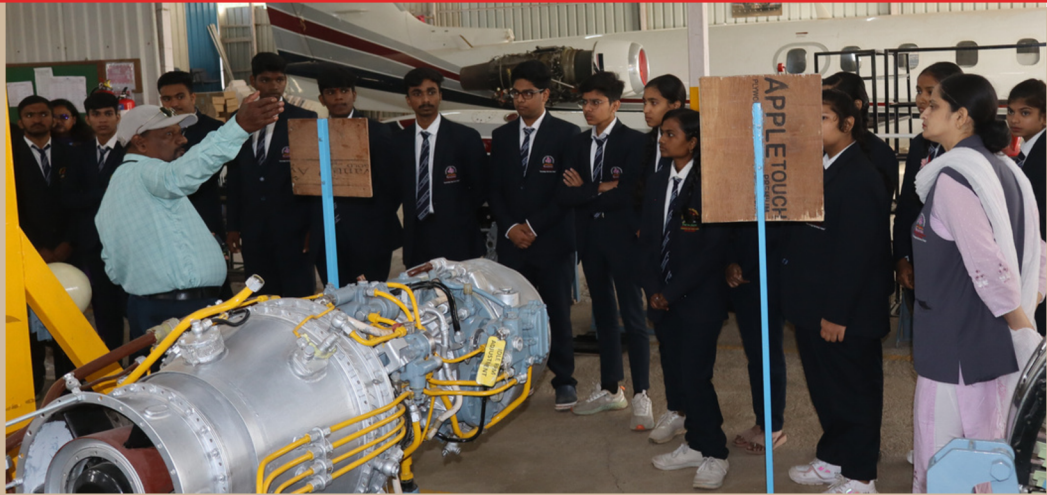
Periwinkle School and Junior College Visits Shastri Campus

Students from Periwinkle School and Junior College spent Children's Day on the Shastri campus, wandering through hangars and labs rather than classrooms. There wasn't any big show, just a simple tour where curiosity did most of the work.



Planes, Cockpits, and Questions

The highlight was standing beside a life-size training aircraft, watching tiny faces tilt upward. Inside the cockpit, switches and screens turned into stories: who flies, who fixes, who keeps passengers safe, and how many different hands make one flight happen. The crew roles were explained in a way children could piece together; less technical, more “this is what people do here.”

A Thought Left Hanging in the Air

By the end, the students walked back to their buses carrying more than chocolates or balloons; they carried the idea that an airport is full of real people doing work they might grow into one day.

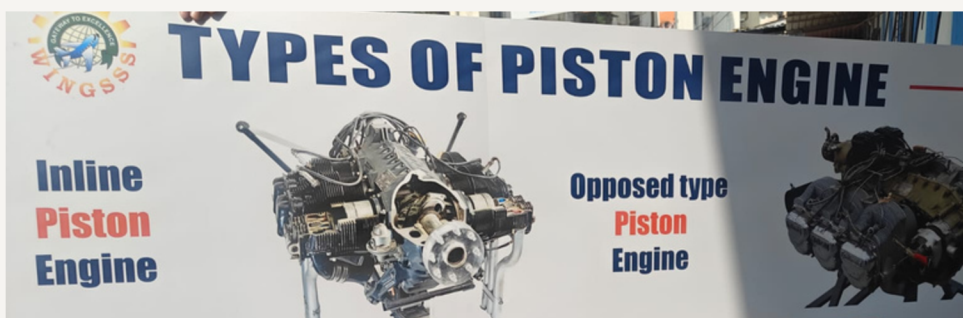
A Full-Campus Check

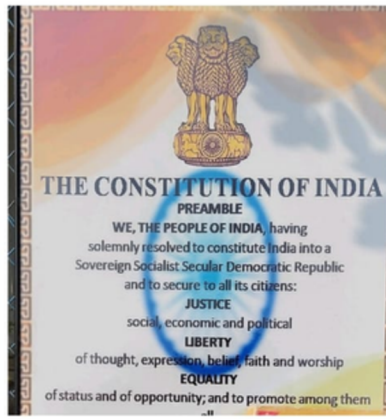
The inspection verified that what we state on paper holds up in reality.

Reading the Preamble Together

Later, everyone gathered and read the Preamble aloud. It was a moment of tomorrow's youth being built: students standing together, speaking the same lines, realising that the document they study is actually a framework shaping the world they live in.

More than a Routine

It pushed students to think a little, question a little, and see the Constitution as something that belongs to them too. In its own way, the morning managed to make the subject feel less distant and more connected to the way they live, study, and grow.

Looking at the Constitution through Their Own Lens

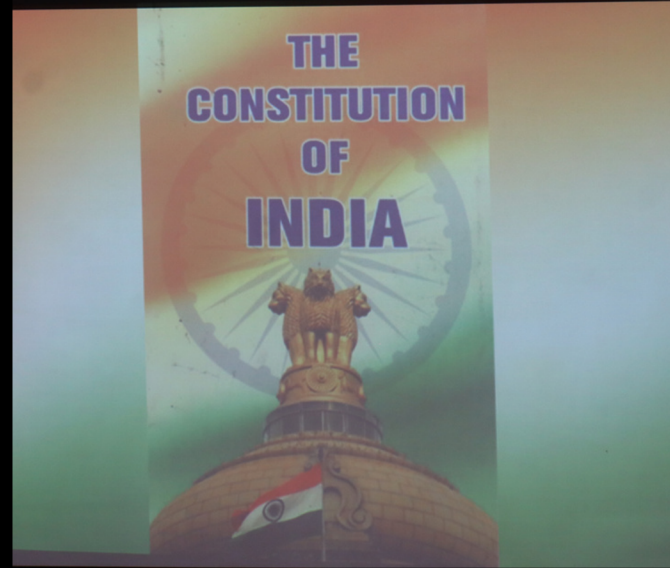
To mark Constitution Day, students from Prestige Public School spent time creating posters around different parts of the Indian Constitution. Instead of copying definitions, they tried putting ideas into their own words and visuals: rights, duties, equality, freedom, justice, fraternity. The posters weren't just another assignment, but more of students trying to make sense of things that affect lives.

A Simple Lecture with Clear Purpose

Constitution Day at Wingsss Aviation & Hospitality was marked through a straightforward lecture; no big setup, just a room full of students and a conversation about why India's Constitution matters beyond dates and definitions. The discussion opened with the basics: what a Constitution actually is, the idea that it acts as the country's guiding framework, and why India needed one in the first place.

Talking Through the Building Blocks

The session walked the students through how the Constitution took shape; how the drafting began in 1947, the role of Dr. B. R. Ambedkar, and the work of the Constituent Assembly. Instead of turning it into a history-heavy talk, the session kept things accessible, touching on the sheer scale of the document, the thought behind it, and the intention to create a system that protects people, defines power clearly, and prevents misuse of authority.

Rights, Duties, and How They Fit into Daily Life

From there, the lecture shifted into what the Constitution actually gives us: everything from fundamental rights to the responsibilities expected from citizens. Students heard about the six fundamental rights, the eleven duties added later, and how these two sides keep the whole system balanced. It wasn't an abstract explanation; the focus stayed on how these ideas show up in real life, in behaviour, in everyday choices, and in the way institutions operate.
